The Collingwood Years



The death of Admiral Lord Nelson at the Battle of Trafalgar thrust his second in command Vice-Admiral Cuthbert Collingwood into the limelight, but at the time no one, least of all Collingwood himself, could have imagined that his command would leave him in theatre for the next five years. He missed the state funeral of his close friend whose 'ever to be lamented death' he reported to the world, and he never set foot on English soil again. Yet during those five years he became 'England's prime and sole minister acting upon the sea' and demonstrated that he was a consummate strategist.

It was the professionalism and dominance of the Royal Navy post Trafalgar that contained the hegemony of Napoléon Bonaparte, a fact that the Emperor finally recognised in exile, but failed to appreciate at the time. This blinkered attitude was in stark contrast to that of his most famous land opponent, the Duke of Wellington, who said 'If anyone wishes to know the history of this war, I will tell them that it is our maritime superiority [that] gives me the power of maintaining my army while the enemy is unable to do so.'

The great victory at Trafalgar and the death of Nelson overshadowed the importance of the subsequent role played by Collingwood and it is only recently that we have seen efforts to put the record straight.

This unique conference is part of that process. Moreover, it is the first to focus on the workings of sea power during the years that followed Trafalgar and to contrast them with the strategic, operational and administrative complexities faced by today's Royal Navy.
